Long Distance Challenge 2018



The children did really well to keep going running or walking around the field, on what was a really warm morning. The course this year was narrower and included a few chicanes, in order to make the most of the limited shade around the field!

The pupils who completed the most laps in each class are as follows:

Class 1: Elizabeth Costain & Riley Carrano 25 laps

Class 2: Connor Russell 39 laps

We also counted up how many laps we completed as a school:

Rainbow: 358 laps

Class 6: 657 laps

...which makes a grand total of 3,763 laps! Each lap measures approximately 348m, which means as a school, we ran 1,309,524m, or 1,309.524km, which is over 813 miles! WOW! This is about the same number of air miles as it is between Maidstone and

Majorca!

The winning house this year was Peacock, who completed a staggering 1076 laps of the field in total. Well done to everybody in Peacock.
