- Think about your friends-we know that you are missing them at the moment. Who are your friends? How do you help them? What do you like to play with them?

## Child Initiated Play!

- Have a lovely time playing at home.
- When you have finished playing, tell a grown up about what you enjoyed and think about something you learnt.
- · You might like to make a bird food cake or bird snack to help the birds in this very cold weather!

#### Bird food cakes

Caution: Check for allergies.

#### You will need (for one cake)

- 1/2 cup lard or suet (room temperature)
- 1 cup of mixed bird seed, unsalted peanuts, grated cheese, raisins, oats, stale bread and cake
- mixing bowl
- yoghurt pot
- string

#### Method

- 1. Mix the ingredients together in a bowl.
- Make a small hole in the bottom of the yoghurt pot and thread a loop of string through the hole.
- 3. Tie a knot to secure the two ends of string inside the pot.
- Pack the pot tightly with the mixture and then place in the fridge overnight to harden.
- Push the hardened mixture out of the yoghurt pot, cutting the pot if needed.
- 6. Hang the bird food cake in a tree or shrub.

#### Bird Snack

#### You will need

- · Slice of bread or bagel
- Peanut butter or lard
- Raison
- Bird seed
- Cereal-Cheerios/Rice Krispies/Cornflakes
- Knife for spreading
- Rolling pin/spoon
- String/ribbon

#### Method

- 1. Spread the bread
- 2. Crush the cereal with the back of a spoon or rolling pin
- 3. Sprinkle the crushed food over the bread
- 4. Make a hole in the slice
- 5. Thread some string or ribbon through the hole
- 6. Tie your bird snack onto a branch outside



## Phonics

 Play quick-write phonemes. Ask your grown up to say one of the sounds we have learnt and write it down.




- Play Phonic games online-select Phase 3 sounds v, w, x, y, z, zz, qu
- Read the words by segmenting and blending each sound



## Focus 'qu'

- 'qu' is a digraph (2 letters together that make one sound). It is often found at the beginning of words.

- Use a phoneme frame. Can you build the words by placing each phoneme into a box to segment the sounds? Remember that if the sound is a digraph both letters need to go in one box on the frame. Copy each word 3 times?

## Maths Focus

- Warm up-Roll a dice (or pick a number written on a piece of paper, numbers 1-6). Can you read the number and then do that exact number of jumps, hops or claps? Challenge your grown up to have a turn!
- Today, we are thinking about how all numbers are made up with smaller numbers.
- For example 5 can be composed of 1 and 1 and 3 or 2 and 3 or 1 and 4!



## Maths-Challenge

We are going to learn which numbers work together to make the number 6.

Use your fingers to show different ways to make 6 i.e. 5 fingers on one hand and 1 on the other or 3 fingers and 3 fingers.

Make a mistake i.e. hold up 4 fingers and 4 fingers. Can they recognise it? Can they correct it?

Play a game. Roll a dice (or use your numbered pieces of paper) and read the number.

Use a pile of Lego blocks, bricks or even squares of paper of two different colours.

Challenge the children to show you different ways to make 6 using the resources.

Can they write the number sentence? i.e. 1 and 5 make 6 etc.





## Child Initiated Play!

- What will you choose to play with now?
- When you have finished playing, tell a grown up about what you enjoyed and think about something you learnt.
- You might like to make some snow shapes just like Kipper did in the story by falling backwards into the snow! Find some interesting shapes to draw around on white paper. Practise your scissor skills by carefully cutting them out. Do they look like the shapes that Kipper made? Can your grown up guess what you drew around?
