TEACHING AND LEARNING SHOWCASE

Year R

This term's project was 'Me and My Community. Rainbow Class have had a very busy first term at school! We started by thinking about friendships and families; talking about how we are all different but special. We used mirrors to look carefully at our faces and drew self-portraits. We also shared photos of our families with each other.





Everyday we practice our fine motor skills ready for writing and our gross motor skills to keep healthy and fit!









We have enjoyed listening to lots of stories such as, We're Going on a Bear Hunt, Peace at Last and FunnyBones and explored them further through fun activities linked to each story.

These included, making an x-ray picture of our hand, re telling the stories in our own words using props, making tactile story maps and even pretend role play in our hospital!







In maths, we have been exploring numbers and counting. Numicon is helping us to work on these skills.

We even had a visitor when we talked about people who help us in our community. Thank you Inspector Milton!





Year 1 This term's project was 'Paws, Claws and Whiskers'





The project got off to an exciting start when Henry, Mrs Miller's dog, came for the afternoon! We learnt all about how to look after, feed and exercise him. We even got to stroke and cuddle him as he came round to say hello!




We learnt to sort animals as to whether they are carnivores, herbivores or omnivores.

We had a real treat the day Inspector Milton came to visit! She answered all our questions and let us try on her hats, coats as well as letting us have a look at her handcuffs and radio!




Year 2 This term's project was Coastlines.

In English, we created some fantastic diary entries, postcards and sea creature fact files. In Art and D.T, we created our very own 'The Great Wave' pictures using pencil or watercolour AND made some super 'Mr Grinling' lighthouses! We made maps with keys in Geography and have worked hard to improve and advance our place value and addition and subtraction skills in Maths. We also had a very special visit from a police officer! We learnt all about her very important job and discussed how we can stay safe


















Year 3 This term's project was 'Mighty Metals' and Year 3 have been investigating forces in so many fun ways applying their skills in science and DT too. The activities have included;

★ Parachutes- exploring the forces and making their own





★ Building cars and conducting a fair test experiment









- ★ Investigating levers and fulcrums
- ★ Exploring magnetism and the properties of materials
- ★ Making spinners and exploring friction

Year 3 have used 'The Iron Man' as a source of inspiration for their English lessons. Ms. Moss has been pleased with the amazing writing being produced and the range of complex grammatical features included. The class have explored the vocabulary used to describe the sights and sounds of a woodland at night by building their own camps.



Year 3 have also built a 'friend for the Iron Man' using recycled materials.



Year 3's Maths for this term has seen them securing their place value knowledge and beginning to apply this to addition and subtraction.

In addition to this, Year 3 have also enjoyed completing Eddie and Ellie's Wild Adventure project which focuses on the 3R's and visited the Thakeham construction site as part of this.



This term's project was 'I am Warrior!' The children have enjoyed learning about famous Romans, such as Spartacus, Julius Caesar and Emperor Claudius- and even a famous Celt, Boudicca!



First, they learned about the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79AD, which buried the city of Pompeii.

The children wrote newspaper articles about the disaster, and later presented these to the class in the style of a news presenter on the television.

Year 4 experienced life as a Roman child this term as they dressed up for the day! They made Roman bread and learned about the daily routine of children nearly 2000 years ago.







The class made Roman bread from an ancient Recipe. The class were undecided whether they liked the bread as it was very salty!

Year 4 designed and made their own shields for the Roman army. They learned of the types of soldiers that could be found in the army, as well as the different parts of the uniform and weapons. They even managed to practise some Roman formations such as the 'tortoise' and the 'orb'!







The children finished this term by learning about the Colosseum and the gladiator fights that happened there. The highlight of one English 'experience' lesson was going outside to role play these battles in slow motion and freeze framing.

Year 5


This term's project was 'Pharaohs'. Year 5 have enjoyed a 'Memorable Experience' watching the 'mummification' of Mrs Smith!

We made Ancient Egyptian style flat breads and enjoyed eating them with dates and honey.





In DT the children were challenged to build a pyramid, choosing from a range of materials and deciding which was the best for the job.



This term's project was 'Blood Heart' Throughout our topic this term, the children have learned about the functions of the heart and blood. This began with a heart dissection where the children were fascinated by the heart's many components.






They have also carried out their own investigations into the effects of exercise on the heart and are now quite adept at finding and measuring their pulse rate!

Year 6 have also written non-chronological reports linked to the topic and produced some fantastic narrative writing inspired by the Disney short 'Paperman'. This term's mathematics has focused on place value and the four operations, with plenty of resilience on show to tackle long multiplication and division.





In art & design, the children have studied the Swiss sculpture Alberto Giacometti, and designed and created their own wire sculptures.





It certainly has been a busy term! Next stop... WWII and 'A Child's War'.

GOVERNOR'S CORNER

Governors have finally been able to be back in school after 18 + months working with the school remotely and the most enjoyable part by far was seeing the children enjoying being back in class and learning! This term, for governors, is always about strategic planning. We held our first strategic meeting with Mrs Culver and Mrs Downes (Consultant Headteacher) to discuss the school's objectives for the academic year and how we collectively will ensure they are met. Now that we can be back in school, we will be able to see for ourselves the quality of learning being delivered at Lenham.

To be able to ensure that the school meets its objectives, the governing body is split into a finance & premises group and a curriculum group. These groups meet independently of the strategic meeting to closely scrutinise objectives that are set and ensure financial spending is kept on track.

The finance group met early on in the term to discuss all the work that is being completed on our building this academic year. You will have noticed all the scaffolding I am sure, but despite the wet summer, works continue to progress well and the roof is nearly finished.

Yesterday, the curriculum governors met with Mrs Culver to discuss the quality of teaching being delivered in the classes. Governors were interested to find out how the children have been catching up with all the lost time out of school due to the pandemic. We were keen to understand if there were huge variations in knowledge due to remote learning, and how staff had worked at the end of last year to close the gaps for every child. We were very pleased with the hard work of the staff and could see that the children are on track with their learning.

This meeting was finished off by an impromptu visit to all the classrooms to see for ourselves the learning that was taking place. We were impressed by the depth of the children's knowledge and how engaged they were with the individual lessons being taught. We met the children in year R and 1 for the first time and enjoyed the laughter and fun the children in KS1 were having with Mr Holliday on the playground. In KS2 we saw art taking place in Year 3 closely linked to their Might Metals project and science taking place in year 4 and 5 - experiments and predictions for the best material the Romans could use for toilet roll and the ph of Mrs Travis's week-old milk!

In all classes, we saw how the new technology (that arrived just in time before lockdown) was being used to support learning in the classroom.

Finally, on our impromptu tour we popped into year 6 who were completing their extended writing from the study of the Paperman. We had the opportunity to see some of the extended writing that had been completed by the students in their books.

All children in every class were enjoying participating in the learning and were happy to share this learning with us- it was a lovely end to a very busy term




